We are delighted to welcome Wairarapa and Whanganui DHBs to Lippincott New Zealand Instance. This brings the total number of DHBs using Lippincott in New Zealand to 12. There are also 18 community organisations using the online resource.

Lippincott provides monthly usage reports by DHB or organisation. In our last newsletter in November 2015, we reported a total of 185,453 hits on the Lippincott New Zealand Instance. This had increased to 233,782 by the end of February 2016.

Another pleasing achievement is that this year's new graduate nurses are coming to DHBs familiar with Lippincott, having had access to it over the past year of their training. The new grads have been excited about the availability of Lippincott in the workplace, especially their ability to access the new apps.

North Island update

We are still working on streamlining the Lippincott procedures management process, which includes checking the quarterly update emails in a timely and efficient way, so they can be loaded a month after receiving the email.

Updates are checked by subject specialists to ensure that changes Lippincott makes are suitable for the New Zealand Instance. As Lippincott reviews a quarter of their procedures every three months, the task can look daunting.

This month, we offered a one-hour workshop via audioconference on how to deal with the update email in an efficient way. We had seven participants from Lakes, Taranaki, Bay of Plenty and Wairarapa. We received positive feedback and are happy to offer the workshop again if there is interest.

Early Christmas present for Wairarapa DHB nurses

Wairarapa is excited to partner with Midland and South Island DHBs for regional access and management of

the New Zealand Instance of Lippincott Procedures. The inclusion of Wairarapa in the Lippincott group now means 11 of 20 DHBs within New Zealand are using the same procedures for clinical care, and is another step closer to having a nationally agreed platform for nursing procedures.

The resource will make a big difference to staff and patients alike, says nurse educator, Lesley Marsh. "The standardisation of clinical procedures using the latest evidence based practice will further enhance patient safety throughout the Wairarapa.

"The resource means that a clinical procedure is being delivered in the same way, whether it's in a hospital or community setting. Having an up-to-date, centralised online resource will also contribute to professional development and help retain our highly skilled nursing workforce."

DHB Librarian Maryann Cowgill has been a driving force behind the introduction of Lippincott to the Wairarapa. She says Lippincott will provide a practical, easy access tool for our busy clinicians at the point of care. "Lippincott will make it much quicker to find information about a particular procedure and give our staff the confidence that the information they are accessing, is the most up-to-date available."
